NASHVILLE OPERA SELECTED BY SOUTH ARTS TO RECEIVE RESILIENCE FUND GRANT

Nashville, TN—Nashville Opera has been selected to receive a **South Arts Resilience Fund grant in the amount** of \$100,000 to support the <u>Nashville Opera Big Blue Fellowship Program</u>, the Opera on Wheels education and outreach initiative, the newly commissioned and premiered <u>ONE VOTE WON</u>, and strategic planning initiatives with a focus on diversity, equity and inclusion.

With support from The Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, the South Arts Resilience fund is supporting new, region-specific activities to build the long-term resiliency of arts organizations battling the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic. Through this fund, significant grants have been made available to small- and mid-sized arts organizations with a history of visionary leadership and impact. This fund is one of several support mechanisms created by South Arts in an effort to be responsive to the needs of arts organizations across the region. These grants will allow arts organizations to reimagine their work, increasing their resilience and sustainability as cities and states re-open.

When announcing the launch of the South Arts Resilience Fund, Susie Surkamer, CEO and President of South Arts, said, "Arts organizations are in uncharted territory and reinventing themselves quickly to deal with the current situations. There is a lot of creativity in figuring out how to share arts experiences remotely. With these funds, we will help organizations learn and grow from this with careful planning and deep investments into the next phase of their work."
